• ***Our Needs - and Good News***

Occasionally I am asked, “What does our church need?” Thankfully we have solved a lot of our capital requirements through the *Imagine the Future* campaign. I am grateful for your generosity.

Here are three key needs, to be addressed by additional *annually renewed pledges* to our general fund:

- 1) A Part-Time Youth Leader \$ 12,500
This individual will guide and mentor our senior high and middle school youth on Sunday mornings, Sunday evenings, Wednesday evenings, and mission trips and youth conferences.
- 2) A Part-Time Tech Leader \$ 12,500
This person will train, coordinate, and schedule our dedicated volunteers and lead the sound, video and lighting of our worship.
- 3) Music for Worship \$ 10,000
This will provide for the gifted variety of guest instrumentalists who lead worship on Sunday mornings.

We included these needs in our 2016 general fund stewardship drive and our 2017 general fund stewardship drive. But the increases in pledging were modest (due to the deaths and moves away from Sarasota of some committed members of our church and our focus on *Imagine the Future*.)

I am also excited to share good news:

- We have now received 95% of the expected \$ 4.1 million in pledges for our *Imagine the Future* capital initiative.
- Kelly Fitzgerald, our associate pastor for family ministry, and Steven Phillips, our director of music ministries and congregational care, are working with great creativity and dedication.
- In 2017 for the first time in many years, 100% of our general fund pledges were fulfilled.
- The average pledge by our members and friends is at an all-time high.

These are all signs of health and vitality. I am grateful for the strength and momentum of our church.

As we move forward, I am confident we will serve our children, youth and families and our worship and music ministry in even more faithful ways. Your support will be a blessing to the church - and to Kelly and Steven.

• **Introducing Rev. Doug DeCelle**



Rev. Doug DeCelle and his wife, Jenny, have been attending First Presbyterian Church for the past year and a half. We are delighted to have them as a part of our church family and appreciate the gifts and experience in ministry they bring. Doug, a recently retired Presbyterian pastor, will be assisting our

pastoral care team this summer with pastoral care. He is pleased to be invited to be a part of this area of ministry beginning mid-June.

Doug enjoyed a fun childhood in the Los Angeles area. At age 13 his family relocated to Cincinnati, OH for his father's employment. Four years later the family moved again to Cleveland, OH. Doug attended Princeton Theological Seminary. He then married Jenny, five years after they met at the College of Wooster. After Doug's ordination in 1977, they served churches in Pennsylvania, Dayton, OH, and most recently for 14 years in LaGrange, GA. In 1995, Doug earned a doctorate at Louisville Presbyterian Seminary.

The DeCelles moved to Sarasota, in part, to assist with the increasing needs of Jenny's parents—long-time Sarasota residents. Since moving to Sarasota, it has been a new and unusual experience on Sundays for Doug to sit in the pew with Jenny, rather than leading in worship.

- There are so many moments when Kelly or Glen will say something [when leading in worship] that really sparkles and leaves me wondering, 'Why didn't I think of that?'
- Steven's work is brilliant. The Celtic Christmas program, the use of jazz, and the sound of Aaron Copland in the chancel are wonderfully innovative.

- Mary's mastery at the organ gives Sunday worship a lyrical feel.

- I am especially appreciative of the questing character of Glen's and Kelly's preaching, which ventures into theological territory that the entire church will be exploring in the next few years.

The warmth of the congregation and staff have also helped the DeCelles see themselves as a part of the church family. They appreciate being recognized and welcomed by the staff and members, and are regularly invited into meaningful conversation at the events they attend.

Jenny and Doug have two daughters. Their eldest, Kim, is a social worker and PhD candidate. Her husband, Mike, is the acquisitions editor for theology and church history with Rowman and Littlefield. Their younger daughter, Kristen, works remotely in public health. Her husband, Ifelayo, is a pediatrician. Their daughter, Morayo, the DeCelles' grandchild, is two and a half. • **Living a Purpose - Driven Life**

The impact of cancer on one's life is not only disruptive, but can negatively impact one's ability to pursue life goals. Life goals give meaning to a person's life and are important in the development of one's identity.

Member, Jack McDonald, shared a goal he recently achieved in the midst of his cancer. I could not stop smiling from the picture and story he shared showing his witness of tenacity, strength, and hope:

"The big thing for me concerning this walk/run was whether I would even be able to do it. After 8 months of chemo from May 2017 to Jan 2018, I am still feeling the side effects: fatigue, balance issues and peripheral neuropathy, especially in my hands, lower legs and feet. While receiving chemo, I was going to twice-weekly physical therapy sessions, which ended shortly after the chemo did. Now I'm trying to go to LA Fitness 2 or 3 times a week to do treadmill, weights and balancing sets. After the race started, and I realized that running with what felt like uncontrollable concrete boots for feet was impossible, I just started walking as fast as I could without falling forward on my face. When I finished the first mile in 20 minutes, I knew I had a chance to do the whole course (5K = 3.1 miles) in around an hour.

I felt exhausted but really good when I finished. Sitting for a few minutes and chugging a banana smoothie helped a lot. I felt good that I could set a goal for myself and reach it. The active work of doing the race also took my mind off the mental baggage I sometimes feel I'm carrying with the side effects and the overall situation.



I am quite sure that being in the thoughts and prayers of everyone at FPC and in our circle of family, friends and acquaintances played a big part in my being able to do this event and continue my recovery."

Jack also shared that after being gone for a year due to his health, he will be returning to Mote Marine, volunteering in the research lab!

The emotions and feelings that come with the experience of reaching a goal are intensely personal. Some people feel validated that they "still have it," some are reminded of the person they were before cancer, some are strengthened by achieving a huge accomplishment, and others take joy in the simple pleasure they can be a part of a life-changing event.

Tips for Goal-Setting

- Be kind and patient with yourself.
- Practice gratitude.
- Celebrate effort, not just accomplishments.
- Focus on self-care; how you can nurture your mind, body and relationships.
- Recognize positive milestones.
- Seek support from someone you can check with weekly to create accountability.
- Start small; don't create stress.
- Write down your goals, breaking them down into small, manageable chunks.

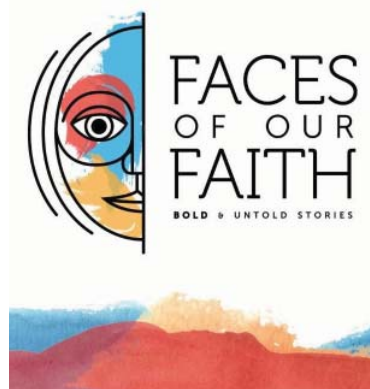

Direct Debit Giving is used to automatically transfer funds from your checking or savings account to the church's bank account.

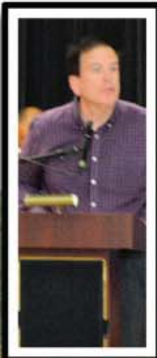
Credit and Debit Card Giving lets you make offerings automatically on a predetermined schedule using a credit or debit card.

HURRICANE IMMEDIATE RESPONSE PROTOCOL

A. Immediately prior to an event (2 days)

1. Email to church members a pastoral letter and the protocol.
2. Staff and property ministry team prepare offices and buildings.
3. Faith community nurse checks on special needs members; deacons will help as needed.
4. Staff takes steps to prepare for alternate location if necessary.
5. Staff, session & Disaster Coordinator share proposed shelter location arrangements (where they will go if unable to stay at home).

B. During

BE SAFE

C. Immediately following an event

1. Pastors, staff and session members are in touch with each other.
2. Faith community nurse contacts special needs members; deacons will help as needed.
3. 24, 48, and 72 hours after a storm at 5:00 p.m. members who can will meet at the church for prayer, checking in, communication, coordination and need sharing.
4. Pastors, operations manager, property ministry team will begin its triage (secure buildings ASAP).
5. As soon as possible, hold a church staff meeting.
6. As soon as possible, the moderator of session will call a session meeting.

D. Peace River Presbytery involvement

1. As soon as possible, the first or second contact person will call the Presbytery office (1-800-736- 4488) to give initial assessment to the Presbytery Disaster Preparedness and Response team (DP&R) of their church, staff, and congregation.
2. 48 hours (the second day) after a storm at 3:00 p.m., all pastors in the affected area will meet at one of the following: ► **First Bradenton**, ► **Church of the Palms (Sarasota)**, ► **Presbytery office (North Port)**, ► **First Fort Myers**, or ► **Moorings Presbyterian (Naples)** to check in with a coordinator from the PRP DP&R leadership team, talk about next steps, and pray.
3. 72 hours (3 days) after an event, pastors and other concerned folk will meet at the Presbytery office (if damaged, then Church of the Palms, Sarasota, or Moorings Presbyterian) for debriefing, prayer, and beginning recovery work.
