

The last few weeks have demonstrated an encouraging trend in pledge receipts; however, we are still down 20% from last year during this period.

You are not alone in wanting to know when our lives, our work, our church, or any plans for 2020 will be able to return to some sense of normalcy. Uncertainty does not rest easily within us. Matthew 6:34 as interpreted in *The Message* translates it this way, "Give your entire attention to what God is doing right now, and don't get worked up about what may or may not happen tomorrow. God will help you deal with whatever hard things come up when the time comes." But until "the time comes" we pray, asking God to provide us with daily resources of comfort, strength, guidance and peace.

As we continue to shelter apart and practice hygiene and physical distance directives, SURE perseveres in its work for justice. SURE continues to work with community leaders seeking to influence justice principles for the ways in which policies are designed and implemented.

Important Issue Updates: Affordable Housing

Dozens of SURE leaders met virtually with Sarasota Mayor Ahearn-Koch to discuss next steps that we want to see taken towards the establishment of an affordable housing fund with \$5 million in dedicated revenue.

Criminal Justice

SURE leaders participated in a statewide effort to remove the "no reason given" option on the state form that officers must fill out when they choose to arrest a child who was eligible for a civil citation. Thousands of people participated in this campaign across the state, and it resulted in us getting a meeting with the Department of Juvenile Justice to discuss the matter.

Restorative Practices

SURE leaders met with school board members Goodwin and Zucker in March to discuss the continuation and growth of the restorative practices pilot program that we won in the spring of 2019. Both board members agreed to support the plan to continue training at the five elementary schools that are a part of the pilot, and to add three other elementary schools.

Joining lead organizer, Brandon Buker-Henshaw, we are pleased to welcome Taylor Marzouca who began work on May 1.

Thoughts About Communion

In session's discussions about communion I have been reminded of a teaching that may be worth sharing during this Covid-19 time. The gospels tell us about the meal when Jesus created a new sacrament to remember the new covenant he was about to die for. It replaced the Jewish Passover feast which was instituted by the Lord to help the Jews remember the old covenant and how he saved them.

The words of institution include "For whenever you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes." There is another way to hear this without changing the meaning. Whenever you eat or drink remember . . .

We don't have to be in a formal setting, but whenever we enjoy the fruits of the earth, whenever we eat and share a meal, remember we do not live by bread alone, and the one who gives us the food we give thanks for also gave his life for our salvation under the new covenant.

While we are not able to celebrate communion in public worship, perhaps its more important to remember the covenant each time we say grace for our meal.





We like to think of ourselves as being selfreliant and pride ourselves on being able to take care of our own needs. Phrases like "carry your own load," "be your own man," "pull yourself up by the bootstraps" are common idioms in our American culture. These values guide us to be responsible and individualistic. There are times, however, when these ideals may keep one from seeking timely help. Sometimes life surprises and humbles us. We simply may not be able to solve or deal with a problem all on our own. A sudden change in life, a loss, unwelcome news, and yes, a bad healthcare diagnosis can create a crisis that may become overwhelming. At times like this, it may be important to have someone listen, care, and walk with you. That is the wonderful service that Stephen Ministry provides.

Stephen Ministers are members of our congregation who listen, care, encourage, and provide emotional and spiritual support for people experiencing a crisis or going through a difficult time. Stephen Ministers receive special training to provide one-to-one Christian care to those in our congregation and community experiencing challenges in life—grief, loneliness, divorce, hospitalization, disability, and many other life difficulties.

The Gift of Listening

People are reaching out more because sheltering at home is getting arduous. The novelty has long worn off, and the emotional, relational, and economic stresses are mounting. Part of what makes what we are all experiencing so difficult is there isn't anything any of us can do to fix it. This is when listening becomes even more critical.

There are times when the goal of listening to someone talk about a challenge is so we can offer a possible solution. For example, if someone is struggling with how to use Zoom and asks if we can help, we listen until we have enough information to offer a helpful response. A different, deeper kind of listening is needed, though, when we are listening to problems that cannot be solved. In this case, the gift, the intention of our listening, is for the other person to feel truly cared for and heard.

The word compassion means "with suffering." To listen with compassion is to stand with a person in the midst of their struggle. It is to be present with them in a way that helps them to feel loved, honored, and respected. It is one of the greatest gifts we can give one another.

It has been pointed out that it is perhaps not a coincidence that the words listen and silent contain the same letters. To truly listen, we have to be comfortable with silence. We also have to be comfortable with silence or not speaking or responding too quickly so as to hijack the other person's story.



You don't need to merely take my word on the power of truly listening to another; you can experience it. Over the next day or two, I invite us all to make an effort to listen intently to the people with whom we interact. Practice the discipline and intention it takes to listen deeply to another person. As you listen to them, listen to truly understand what they are saying, experiencing, feeling, and thinking, and not merely to respond. Ask clarifying questions that let the person know you really care about what they are experiencing. Be still within yourself and be fully present to what they are saying to you. Try this several times and note what happens.

And because reading is a form of listening, I would like to thank you for listening to what I have shared here. I hope it inspires you to listen more carefully and to be more fully present to the people in your life, especially those who are feeling frightened, overwhelmed, and alone right now.

Dear Family Promise of Sarasota Friends,

The Board of Trustees hopes this note finds you and your families safe and healthy.

It has been our promise to keep you informed as to our progress toward opening and sheltering homeless children and their families. As you might imagine, the homeless situation has become worse during the quarantine, which highlights the urgency of our needed progress toward opening our homeless shelter program.

We have made some significant progress toward this goal by securing a day center and office space at Grace Church near Vamo and Tamiami Trail. Soon, we will start construction to make the space comfortable for our staff and guest families as they search for jobs and housing. Grace Church is one of our host churches, and they have been as excited as we are about helping us move forward. We really appreciate all the support they have given us.

Should you know of anyone who works in construction and might be willing to help us in some way, please let me know. Joining together to help those in need is an opportunity to show our solidarity and compassion for each other.

Another critical milestone to our opening and to our long-term success is the search for a director. We are excited to say we have started the search process and will advertise our search in several venues, including the National Family Promise newsletter.

The board would like to ask for your help. It is possible that a qualified candidate may be part of your congregation and would appreciate hearing about the opening.

The board of trustees is also looking for prospective board members, especially those with fundraising experience, community connections and communications experience. Please contact me or any board member to express your interest.

With many of our host congregational campuses temporarily closed due to COVID-19,

our board has been in discussion about how we might help homeless families until we resume sheltering in our host congregations. There are ideas that have been used around the country with other Family Promise affiliates. We will be discussing these options with our partner congregations shortly.

We hope this update keeps you as excited as we are about our progress and our commitment to serving the homeless families in Sarasota! Should you have any concerns, recommendations or questions, we encourage you to share those with us. You are the heart and soul of Family Promise of Sarasota, and without your support we will not be successful.

May God bless you and keep you and your families safe.

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
