



Dear friends,

In April your session appointed a team of seven individuals to conduct a self-study of the congregation and to present a report of its findings. Named to that committee were Emily Weitekamp, Joanne Simons, Janet Olshewsky, Frank Frey, Michael Fingerle, Ed Clissold, and Elaine Barnett (with Elaine agreeing to serve as chair). That team has worked diligently for the last four months, meeting almost weekly, conducting small group sessions with interested members and friends of the congregation, researching the history of this congregation, studying the community in which we serve, listening to hopes for the gifts of a new pastor—praying diligently for God's clear guidance as they compiled their findings and sought to articulate this congregation's place in the larger purpose of God's redemptive work in the world.

On August 24, the team presented its 13-page report to the session for its approval. The session gladly offered its approval, thanking team members for the transparency and faithfulness with which they approached their task.

On September 14 the report will be reviewed by Peace River Presbytery's Committee on Ministry (COM). Their blessing will be the final step needed to clear the path for the congregation to elect a Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) to search for the pastor God is calling to serve next at FPC Sarasota. (The session hopes to call that meeting for October 3, but we will hold those plans lightly until we hear from our Nominating Committee that they are ready for the session to proceed.)

As soon as the report has been reviewed by the COM, we will share electronic copies with you. It also will be available for download from the church's website. Should you prefer a paper copy, you may request one by calling the church office after September 14.

If you would like to learn more about the Mission Study Team's report, there will be three opportunities for conversation:

- by Zoom, 11:00 a.m. Saturday, September 18 (limited to 20 persons, for ease of conversation)
- in-person, 10:10 a.m. Sunday, September 19, in the Fellowship Hall
- by Zoom, 1:00 p.m. Thursday, September 23 (limited to 20 persons, for ease of conversation)

Links to sign up for Zoom conversations will be available through *News at First* starting September 1. Should those sessions fill to capacity, we will gladly schedule additional opportunities.

Please join the session in expressing heartfelt gratitude to the Mission Study Team for this labor of love, and please continue to hold all parties in prayer as the Nominating Committee engages in conversation with potential candidates for the Pastor Nominating Committee. May the Holy Spirit keep moving in all of our hearts, preparing the path in front of us.

As we lift the whole suffering world into the light of God's love, it remains my joy and privilege to share this season with you, and to witness God stirring in this community.

#### Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) Earthquake in Haiti

#### Updated Session COVID Policy

Masks are required of all persons (over the age of two) who are on our campus, including outdoor gatherings. This is in response to the rapidly rising COVID-19 cases in our area and evidence that the Delta variant is more easily transmitted than previous strains (even by fully vaccinated, asymptomatic persons). An exception is granted for fully vaccinated adult groups who are working outside (with no children present). Such groups may decide together whether they intend to mask.

We do this out of concern:

- for our children, who are not able to receive vaccinations:
- for the most vulnerable members of our community, who may be at risk, even if vaccinated;
- for the larger community, to help to slow the spread of the virus.

Your session is committed to remaining flexible to respond to circumstances as they change. Together we will navigate these challenges. We will worship with joy—whether online or in person—and give thanks in all circumstances. #### • Be a Life-Saver

You never know when CPR will come in handy. Valerie and I took

an infant CPR course at Sarasota Memorial hospital when our first grandchildren were on their way. Fortunately, none of our now five grandchildren has ever needed us to use our CPR knowledge.

Last year I was having lunch with a good friend and high school classmate when he passed out during lunch. We got him on the floor of the restaurant and he turned gray. I could not feel a pulse or see any evidence that he was breathing.

Several gathered around and some were giving advice. The restaurant staff called 911. I thought that he looked dead and remembered a couple of things from the CPR class. Use both hands to pump where you think the heart is. Don't worry about pumping too hard and pump fast, to the beat of the Bee Gee's tune *Staying Alive*.

I pumped and the paramedic called and asked me to count as I was pumping. They wanted to make sure it was at a fast pace. The paramedics came soon and after a while put him in the ambulance and took him to SMH.

He survived, and after about a week in the hospital was released and headed home to Dallas. We talk more often now and he doesn't even complain about the ribs I broke.

Without CPR he would not be alive today. CPR is not hard to do and it may save or make a new friend. Please attend the FPC class **Wednesday, September 22**.

#### Email: Real or a Scam

More and more, you might be getting emails that are not real, but a scam. Below are a couple of tips from Tampa Bay Presbytery to help you recognize a scam.

- Please be especially attentive to any email that doesn't look right to you or sound like the person it says it's from. Be sure to use the contact information you already have for that person and do not click on "reply" to respond to the purported sender reaching out to you with an unusual request for help in an email that just doesn't seem right.
- If it looks suspicious or gives you reason to worry about the sender, call them at a number you already have for them even if the email says not to call, or email them by opening a new email and using the email address you already have for them -- no matter what the worrisome email says.
- The key is not to click on any links in an odd email or hit "reply." Don't respond even if the address looks correct; even a correct address can be misleading.

#### SURE'S ANNUAL SEPTEMBER HOUSE LISTENING MEETINGS

The 23 congregations comprising SURE annually hold small group meetings each September to learn which justice issues cause congregants concern. When you are called to attend a meeting from one of SURE's network members or team leaders, say "yes." Better yet, offer to bring others with you. Zoom meeting days and times will be announced.

#### STATEWIDE ADULT CIVIL CITATION DATA

One of the difficulties working to increase use of adult civil citations that there is no statewide data collection of adult arrest. Doug Giffin, congregant at St. Wilfred Church, is a retired data analyst who has agreed to help us compile and analyze any data that we can get from our Clerk of Court. In order to be able to compare data from across the state, we need all parties to request the same data. Even then, the task may be difficult. The statewide agencies have been requested to send a letter to their Clerk of Court stating what information is requested. We are requesting 2019 data in order to have pre-pandemic information so that we have a clear baseline from which to work. 2020 is somewhat skewed because of the closures that occurred with COVID-19.



The art of making a mosaic is an ancient one. At times, a mosaic is assembled from broken pieces of tile also called "tesserae." Something beautiful is



created from something that is shattered and broken. The result most often looks nothing like the tile that the mosaic came from.

This can be true in our lives as well. Most of all, they can be with you as God does the healing and creative work in reconstructing a mosaic of your life.

This year 1,200 children will experience homelessness in Sarasota County. Preventing families from spiraling into homelessness is an essential part of the Family Promise mission. Family Promise (FP) served eleven families with children in August, and provided support with maximum efficiency and low cash output.

The FP office and day center location has closed so they must relocate. Several years ago, our church made a generous donation from the *Imagine the Future* campaign to help FP secure a more permanent facility. August 24, 2021, the session approved the use of that money for a one-year lease on a house that will be used by FP to provide much-needed services for homeless pregnant and post-partum women and their babies.

An investment of \$260 can keep a child housed in Sarasota County, but it takes \$5,000 in resources to rehouse an evicted family—which is why prevention is so important. We can't thank you enough for supporting the Family Promise mission and these families.








#### Presbyterian Women






Cotton or lightweight denim fabrics for top Soft, lightweight fabrics for backing (so it won't slip or slide on tabletops and laps)

- 1. Texture (smooth, silky, slick, plush, bumpy, rough, etc.)
- 2. Moves or can be grasped
- 3. Colorful (solids or simple patterns preferred over busy patterns)
- 4. Able to be attached to blanket securely and won't fray or ravel

Items can be upcycled from things you would normally throw away

Examples include:

Large buttons

Velcro and elastic

Pockets from pants/jeans/shorts

Belt loops

Plastic rings and D-rings

Ribbon, rickrack, fringe, lace and trims

Elastic hair ties

Zippers, buckles and snaps

Beads

Empty thread spools

Shoestrings

Buttoned cuffs from sleeves

Mesh and netting

Pieces of washable fabric such as flannel, minky, fleece, ripstop nylon, lycra, terry cloth

I wish to send a special shoutout to Rachel Martin! In early August Rachel, along with her son, Zach, and his girlfriend, were at Lido Beach one evening when they spotted a sea turtle hatchling. Normally, a hatchling heads straight for the water, usually at night. In best conditions, the brightest light is moonlight shining on the water, which attracts hatchlings, just as it guides mother turtles back to the water after they lay their nests. Rachel rescued the hatchling, and Mote Marine Laboratory staff members were able to make sure the hatchling had time to rest before they released it to the sea the next morning.

Remember, if you live on the beach, please keep your lights off or invest in sea turtle-safe lighting.

The twenty-year Commemoration of September 11 is being held on Saturday, September 11, from 6:00 - 7:30 p.m. at Patriot Plaza at the Sarasota National Cemetery, 9820 State Road 72, Sarasota, FL, 34241. (Rain Date: Sunday, September 12, same time & location.)

In the days leading up to the Commemoration, citizens will be able to choose a person who was killed on September 11 and represent each by standing at the appropriate time. Names of the deceased can be selected by visiting: https://bit.ly/911FREETickets During the commemoration all will be invited to stand and say the name of the individual they have selected from the 3,042 people who died during the attacks. Those arriving before 5:55 p.m., may place memorabilia of their chosen Fallen on the Gallery surrounding an American flag of flowers.

Everyone who is comfortable, feeling well and is not with a weakened immune system is invited to attend. The event's COVID-19 protocol encourages both participants and those attending to wear face masks. As the event approaches, the protocol will be updated to comply with government mandates and local conditions.
