

#### Dear friends.

As I write, we are just a few days away from electing elders, deacons, Officer Nominating Committee members, and a Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC). That will happen on Sunday, October 3 during our congregational meeting. The meeting will take place both in person (in the sanctuary) and by Zoom, beginning at 11:15 a.m. If you will be participating by Zoom, and have more than one voting member in your household, please do be sure that each person has an electronic device (laptop, smartphone, etc), if you wish for each person's vote to be counted. The biographies of all nominees are available through the News @ First. Please be in prayer for all who have agreed to serve in these important days—and when you have the opportunity, please thank them for their service.

We also need to thank our Nominating Committee, who have modeled sacrificial service over the last year, undertaking responsibilities they could not have anticipated at the beginning of their terms. They have prayed and discerned (together and with candidates) and exhibited such faithfulness. Please thank: Sandi Soper, Marcia Schaper, Carolyn Simmons, Scott McLeod, Jean Fulton, Kay Dunn, Clare Carter, Elaine Barnett, Patti Wrobel (deacon representative), and co-moderators Dick Clapp and Lisa Saba.

I want to let you know a bit about what you may expect in the weeks to come as our Pastor Nominating Committee begins its work. The following persons are being nominated to serve on the PNC: Michael Fingerle, Frank Frey, Steve Knopik, David Landers, Carrie Mills, Janet Olshewsky, and Kay Steinman. Once a committee is elected by the congregation, representatives from the presbytery's Committee on Ministry (COM) will train the team for its task. Our ongoing liaison to the COM will be Steve McConnell, pastor of Church of the Palms. Steve is gracious and wise and will be a wonderful voice of encouragement to our team.

The PNC will begin by deciding how they want to be organized and by electing leaders (likely a chairperson and secretary). After they are organized, one of the first tasks of the PNC will be to develop the form (a Ministry Information Form or MIF) that will advertise the position. Information gathered from the congregation during our recent mission study will inform that process. Both the session and the presbytery's COM will approve the MIF. Once that document is approved, the PNC can begin to seek candidates (through our denomination's computerized matching system; through popular publications; by word of mouth; and perhaps most importantly, through active recruitment).

Unlike committees of the session (the model with which we are most familiar), the PNC will be a committee of the congregation. That means that they will not report back to the session, unless they need approval for a decision that has budgetary implications. The PNC will make regular progress reports to the congregation on its process, but will need to operate with complete confidentiality regarding candidates. This is an exciting time in the life of this congregation. Please do keep all of the leaders you are about to elect in your prayers. There is nothing more important for any of us to do than to keep opening our hearts to the Spirit's leading. God is good.

## Pastoral Development Seminar and Faith Focus Weekend Update

One of the programs valued by First Presbyterian Church, Sarasota, is the **Pastoral Development Seminar**. This program provides an opportunity for young pastors to come to our campus twice to meet with a resource person who is an active pastor with great experience and wisdom. This has resulted in more than 40 young pastors through the years having spent time learning and growing in their ministry gifts as they received the rich hospitality of our congregation as we provided meals, lodging, the seminar, and moments of relaxation for the groups. The ministry has made a great impact on these lives and on the lives in the congregation.

Because of COVID, we postponed the group of six committed to come in October 2020 until October 2021. That group has been meeting via Zoom with the resource person, Lori Raible, Pastor of Selwyn Avenue Presbyterian in Charlotte, NC. They have become a support community for each other as these days continue to be impacted by COVID. Recently the group asked our church to postpone again the beginning of the seminar until February 2022 because of their concerns about traveling. They all have young children. Because their children cannot be vaccinated at this moment, the FPC Seminar Leadership Team agrees with their request.

So, we now have eight young pastors planning to join us February 2-5, 2022 and October 19-23, 2022. Please pray for Lori Raible as she continues to work with this group between now and then through virtual meetings, and for the FPC Seminar Leadership Team as we move ahead making faithful, healthy, and wise decisions for the coming months.

Be assured that our Faith Focus Weekend will happen as planned October 23-24, 2021. Join us Saturday, October 23, for an event on Saturday entitled, "Bridging the Gap," and on Sunday, October 24, for worship built around the theme of hope and healing toward racial reconciliation. is a friend of this congregation, has preached here several times, led the Faith Focus Weekend several years ago and gave our congregation the idea of forming the Manasota Interracial Book Clubs.

Saturday from 10:00 a.m. - 12:30 p.m. in our Fellowship Hall, we will participate in a panel discussion entitled, "Black/White Church Partnerships: A Bridge across the Racial Divide." This is sponsored by Manasota Interracial Book Clubs (MIBC) and features a panel of active pastors discussing ways congregations and individuals can become a bridge across the racial divide. Rev. Roberts will then give a presentation entitled, "Now What?! Reflections on Christian Activism." He will lead us in exploring how we each can take steps to help build a more just and equitable society. There will also be a time for questions and answers about this timely topic. All adults and youth are invited to take part in this free event offered to the church and community. Come join this opportunity to learn faithful ways to Bridge the Gap with all of God's people.

## • Feeling Talking, and Trusting

Anyone who has experienced trauma of any kind knows that healing always takes longer than expected. Those who have experienced trauma also know that when the anniversary of the trauma comes around, even years later, the waves of fear, anxiety, helplessness, and sadness will often return. This is not a bad

thing, as it can provide an ideal time to talk again about the trauma, and talking about it is an essential key to healing.

The feelings following trauma are overwhelming at first. They can come like waves that feel as though they threaten to drown the person who has experienced the trauma. The key to working through these intense feelings and beginning the healing process is to simply accept the feelings and let them flow. If the feelings

are blocked, the healing is blocked. Feelings are never right or wrong; they just are, and they need to be expressed.

The next task involved in healing from trauma or loss is talking with others about what one has experienced. There are really only two choices here—we can either talk things out, or we can act them out. If we don't talk things out, we will likely act them out by being irritable, violent, withdrawing, or possibly turning to alcohol and other drugs. It may be helpful to remember that beneath much of the negative acting out behavior we see in the world is trauma or loss that has not been healed.

Feeling and talking are made possible when we have people in our lives that we can trust. We need to seek these people out if we are in recovery from trauma and avoid isolating from others—a common temptation when we are hurting. Finding a trusted person who will simply listen is key to healing any kind of trauma.

It's important to create a trusting space where they can feel and talk for as long and as often as they need to. You can create safe places for others as well by being available as an attentive listener for those around you who are hurting. Listening and not judging are key.

There is a saying that "time heals all wounds." By itself, this saying is incomplete, though. Healing does take time, but time alone does not heal all wounds. What does heal all wounds is feeling, talking, and trusting—again and again.

This month, take some time to check in with yourself and someone you have been thinking

about. Know your church family is here for you with well-equipped deacons, Stephen Ministers, and the Pastoral Care Team ready to listen. Please contact Cheryl Track, Faith Community Nurse, if we can be of assistance.


Mrs. Tuttle, an ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) teacher sees students in grades K-5 and had never been adopted.

#### Construction Materials List

Breast surgery recovery pillow donations Washable soft fabrics (e.g., lightweight flannel) Polyester fiberfill

Spools of white sewing thread

Fidget blanket donations - ALL ITEMS MUST BE WASHABLE

Cotton or lightweight denim fabrics for top Soft, lightweight fabrics for backing (so it won't slip or slide on tabletops and laps)

Various items with the following properties are needed:

- 1. Texture (smooth, silky, slick, plush, bumpy, rough, etc.)
- 2. Moves or can be grasped
- 3. Colorful (solids or simple patterns preferred over busy patterns)
- 4. Able to be attached to blanket securely and won't fray or ravel

Items can be upcycled from things you would normally throw away

Examples include:

Large buttons

Velcro and elastic
Pockets from pants/jeans/shorts
Belt loops
Plastic rings and D-rings
Ribbon, rickrack, fringe, lace and trims
Elastic hair ties
Zippers, buckles and snaps
