Dear friends,

Each year, you elect new elders to serve on your session. Because terms rotate, typically a third of session members are new when the group convenes for the first time in late January. This year, the session also chose to gather earlier in the month for a half-day retreat, so that we might build deeper friendship and offer our prayers for the church. Having shared that in-person retreat time, and then gathered by Zoom for our monthly meeting, I want you to know what confidence I feel in this constellation of leaders, as I watch them begin to work together, and open their hearts to God's leading.

We began our retreat with a simple ice-breaker prompt: "Tell us something about yourself that we are unlikely to know." As we shared responses, I was reminded how important it is to hear each other's stories—and also of the vulnerability that is required of us, in order to let ourselves be known. Your session already is rising to the invitation of this season with the questions they are asking, the prayers they are lifting, the offerings they are making.

In the Presbyterian system of governance, the session has broad responsibility for the life of the church. Pastors moderate session meetings, but their votes count the same as each elder's. Sessions seek to discern God's leading together, trusting that through all the various gifts in the body, God has equipped the church with everything necessary to fulfill its mission. You are in good hands.

You already know that your Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) is hard at work seeking the pastor God is calling to serve with you in the years ahead, but it's important that their work not be rushed. Because I will leave on May 27 of this year, it is likely that there will be a gap between my departure and the arrival of your new pastor. Anticipating that, your session has appointed a team of three (Dave Householder, Carol Papa and Denise Landers) to seek out a local pastor who could bridge that gap with you.

The months ahead will be filled with work and joy and anticipation. With that in mind, I leave you this blessing by John O'Donohue:

• **Message from the Pastor Nominating Committee**

We have begun! We wrote our Mission Information Form (MIF) in October. Our session approved it in November and presbytery approved it in December. After Christmas, our MIF was posted on the PC(USA) denomination's website so any pastor looking for a new church opportunity can learn about us. Pastors wanting to relocate fill out a Personal Information Form (PIF) telling their training and experience, their leadership styles, and their personal statements of faith. They submit them to the PC(USA) website where they are sorted and then sent to churches looking for pastors.

We have already received the first batch of PIFs and have received training in how to read and evaluate them. As they sound promising, we will contact the applicants to ask for additional information. We will receive another batch of PIFs in about three weeks, and so on until we find the pastor God has planned for our church. All of us on the PNC will read all of the PIFs and compare our impressions. When one or more candidates begin to stand out above the rest, we will contact them with further questions and conversation. As you can see, this is just the beginning of a lengthy process that will last several months. We plan to meet weekly.

What can you do? Please pray for us as we meet on Monday evenings at 7:00 p.m. via Zoom. Pray for our next pastor, that he or she will be receptive to God's call. And if you know any pastors outside our Peace River Presbytery that might be good candidates, please give us their names and encourage them to apply. They will know how to do it.

• **Caritas Announcement**

Caritas of Sarasota was established in 1980 as a joint effort of five downtown churches headed by St. Martha's Catholic Church, with First Baptist Church, First United Methodist Church, Church of the Redeemer, and First Presbyterian Church, Sarasota.

It is an outreach ministry that provides food and other assistance to Sarasota residents in acute financial need (e.g., utility payments, prescriptions, transportation, and work attire). The **Herrig Caritas Center**, which replaced the original interview facilities, is located at 1645 Fruitville Road, and was dedicated in 2018. The **Caritas Food Pantry** is housed at First Baptist Church on Main Street.

The COVID-19 pandemic has resulted in new safety operating procedures that necessitate additional volunteers. Our church does not currently have sufficient volunteers to assist clients at the **Herrig Caritas Center**. However, FPC will continue sending financial support to the mission at **Herrig Caritas Center**. We are grateful for our teams of FPC volunteers who will continue to serve by assisting in the **Caritas Food Pantry**. Dr. Neddy Astudillo here on **Sunday, February 6** to preach and lead conversation on the Christian response and responsibility for care of the earth and the climate. We have found ways to honor the *Faith Focus Weekend* part of our initiative, but it simply has not been possible to safely gather young pastors from around the country for our *Pastor Development Seminar*. Three times we have made plans with a fine group of young pastors who were eager to come, only to watch COVID numbers rise to such an extent that we all agreed it was not prudent for them to travel. In the meantime, though, the Rev. Lori Raible of Selwyn Avenue Presbyterian Church in Charlotte has used Zoom to build community with these gifted young leaders. All involved have reported being blessed by that experience. God continues to work God's purposes out, often in ways that surprise us.

In the midst of our current COVID spike, our leadership team has made the painful but wise decision to pause planning for the next Pastoral Development Seminar and Faith Focus Weekend until COVID is more in the rearview mirror and our new pastor is called and installed. We look forward with great hope to beginning this ministry again in October 2023.

The response over the years from members of our church family has been amazing as they gave financial support, hosted participants, fed many people and came to listen and offer comment to sermons. We know we can count on you when we return.

We began with hope, and we continue to be filled with hope for the future for FPC and this ministry!

• **The Rev. Dr. Neddy Astudillo Will Be Our Guest Preacher Sunday, February 6**



Neddy is a Venezuelan-American, an ecotheologian and PC(USA) pastor who has taught in seminaries in Guatemala, Bolivia, Peru, México and the United States. She explains ecotheology this way: "Ecotheology is reflecting on our faith from a belief in God as Creator. It seeks to find faith-based solutions to the environmental challenges of our time, lifting up Creation care as an act of faith."

Neddy has a Doctor of Ministry in "Greening the Church." In 1998, she co-founded the Angelic Organics Learning Center, a farm-based nonprofit organization, where people connect with food, farming and caring for the earth.

Neddy will be preaching in both the 9:00 a.m. NewSong worship service and the 11:00 a.m. traditional service. Between services, from 10:15 to 10:45 a.m. in the Fellowship Hall, Neddy will be available for a question-and-answer time. SURE Working to Win an Adult Civil Citation Program

Because of COVID concerns, all research meetings with the team and officials were conducted over Zoom. We continue to reaffirm the serious nature of the problem we are researching.

Clerk of Court Submits Requested Data

The purpose of the meeting with the Clerk of Court was to receive raw data on adult arrests in Sarasota County so that we can conduct the analysis we have done in other counties.

What SURE Requested

1. All arrests and “Notice to Appear” events in the county (including felonies)
2. All dates in 2019
3. All the arresting agencies in Sarasota County
4. Information provided electronically in an Excel spreadsheet with line-by-line arrests.

After much discussion and some clarification, the Clerk of Court stated that a list would be sent of all of the 2019 misdemeanor and felony cases, including the case number, name, date of birth, arrest data, and race. This has been received for our review.

The team is indebted to master data expert Doug Griffin of St. Wilfred Episcopal Church. His expertise is needed so that we have a better understanding of how we relate to officials and ascertain that what we are presenting is based upon accurate information.

Adult Civil Citation Draft Received from Assistant State Attorney

We received the draft of an adult civil citation program from the Assistant State Attorney which he titles, Adult Pre-Arrest Diversion (APAD). SURE’s Criminal Justice Committee attended the meeting with the Assistant State Attorney fully aware they were participating to better understand the rationale for particular

items in the proposal and to learn the timeline for implementation.

• **Presbyterian Women**


On January 4, Presbyterian Women hosted Cindie Moore from the Association of Mam Christian Women for Development to receive an update on the progress in Guatemala. The Mam are an indigenous group of people living in the mountainous region of Guatemala near Mexico. In the recent past, we assisted the Mam women with funds to purchase cook stoves, cattle sheds and incaparina, a drink mix for their malnourished children.

Cindie tells us the need is still great to reduce hunger in the children. Each malnourished child is weighed, measured and given incaparina and then monitored. Mothers are given instruction on nutrition and how to raise egg-laying chickens and grow vegetables. • **Giving From the Heart is Good for Your Heart**

Giving blood is part of a heart-healthy lifestyle and donating on a regular basis has proven health benefits. In fact, studies have shown that donating blood can be good for your heart.

There have been studies published that show blood donors enjoy better health (*Transfusion 2007*) and blood donation reduces blood pressure (*Transfusion 2016*) and cholesterol (*Am J Epi 1998*).

High blood pressure is one of the leading risks for heart attacks and there is evidence that regular blood donations may be beneficial. Being a regular donor may help with blood flow and reduce arterial blockages.

High iron stores can increase a person's risk of heart attacks. When you give blood it depletes your iron stores and helps your body create new blood. About 500ml of whole blood is taken during each blood donation, which removes 225-250mg of iron. You do have to be careful if you tend to be on the anemic side that you don't give too much each year. There are plenty of other meaningful things you can do to promote heart health. Check out *28 Days Towards a Healthy Heart Calendar* https://www.nhlbi.nih.gov/sites/default/files/publications/HM-2022-28-DaysFactSheet_508.pdf.

Each time you donate you'll receive a free wellness checkup that includes blood pressure check, pulse and temperature taken, iron count, and cholesterol reading. You can use the results of this checkup to determine your cardiovascular risk factor as well as other possible health conditions.

The Health and Wholeness Ministry hosts SunCoast Blood Mobile four times a year. Our drive liaison recently shared these numbers from our 2021 drives:

- March 28: Donors presented: 15,
Units Collected: 15, New Donors: 1
- August 29: Donors presented: 29,
Units Collected: 35, New Donors: 10
- October 24: Donors presented: 17,
Units Collected: 18, New Donors: 1
- December 19: Donors presented: 20,
Units Collected: 23, New Donors 3

The 2021 total is 81 donors presenting, 91 units collected, and 15 new donors. The total lives potentially saved by First Presbyterian Church is 273 in our community. Awesome job! Thank you for all you did for our community and our local hospitals in 2021. Looking forward to our next blood drive, **Sunday, March 20, 2022.**
