

Upon completion of Margaret's interim call at the end of May, the session is pleased to announce that we have contracted with the Reverend Craig Miller to serve as a shortterm Bridge Pastor until our new Pastor / Head of Staff is called. This action has been approved by the

Committee on Ministry (COM) of Peace River Presbytery. His service with our congregation will begin on June 1, 2022.

Reverend Miller did not seek this position; he was referred by a church member and friends of the church. He thought he was ready to "just enjoy retirement" but as we talked and prayed, we all agreed that the Holy Spirit is at work. We are sad that Margaret cannot stay, but we are excited to welcome Craig and his wife, Donna.

Craig obtained a Master of Divinity from Princeton Theological Seminary and recently retired after more than 20 years of full-time ministry serving churches in Pennsylvania, North Carolina, and Florida. He is currently a member of the Presbytery of Tampa Bay and served Forest Hills Presbyterian Church in Tampa for twelve years. His last call was as the Interim Pastor at Camp Hill Presbyterian in Camp Hill, PA. The Millers live in Sun City Center and attend Peace Presbyterian Church in Bradenton. They plan to seek a summer rental in Sarasota to reduce commuting and to be with us in the community. When offered the opportunity to work remotely, he declined, saying effective ministry with colleagues and congregants grows from relationships, and those are best nurtured in person.

We are so very grateful for Margaret's faithful service during this time. We ask for continued prayers for our congregation and for our Pastor Nominating Committee.

This is What We Know

Because of the work of SURE, Sarasota has a successful juvenile civil citation program. In the last 12 months 83% of the children who previously would have been arrested, instead received a juvenile civil citation.

This is What We Want

We now need a similar program for adults. Civil citations are not a slap on the wrist. Adults who receive a civil citation will have to do community service, attend classes and pay restitution if necessary. However, they will not be branded for life with a criminal record. Civil citations allow people to make amends for mistakes and move on with their lives.

This is What was Accomplished at the 2021 Zoom Nehemiah Action

600 members of SURE came together via Zoom, and the Sarasota State Attorney and Sheriff committed to create an adult civil citation program.

This is the Good News

The good news is that a program has been drafted and it includes the misdemeanor driving offenses which we are most concerned about.

This is What SURE Stands Firm On

SURE's concern with the draft is the state attorney wants to charge people \$165 to participate in the adult civil citation program. This will significantly limit the ability of lowincome people to take part. By comparison, in Pinellas County the adult civil citation program is free; in Hillsborough County the fee is \$50.

This is What SURE Decided to do Before the 2022 Nehemiah Action

On March 8, before the Nehemiah Action on April 5, SURE held a prayer vigil in front of the county jail. 31 SURE leaders and clergy attended. The event was covered by two media outlets.



Presbyterian Women understands that scripture asks us to be the hands and feet of Christ in the world. One way we do that is with the Birthday Offering. Received in the spring each year, it gives us a tangible way to celebrate the blessings in our lives. This year the Presbyterian Women Birthday Offering observes a century of generous giving totaling almost \$37 million to-date. Launched in 1922 to honor the 100th anniversary of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Presbyterian Church in the United States, the Birthday Offering is an annual tradition for givers and receivers around the world. Each year, the Birthday Offering awards grants to up to five programs. Primarily making possible capital improvement projects, this offering supports domestic and international ministries, focusing on areas such as agricultural development, child care, community organization, criminal justice, drug counseling, economic justice, elderly care, employment training, homelessness, literacy, violence or women's concerns.

• High Blood Pressure and Stroke

About 65 million Americans –1 in 3 adults– have high blood pressure. Of these, one third don't know they have it.

If you have high blood pressure your heart is pumping harder to move blood through the body. This can weaken blood vessels and damage major organs. Left untreated, it can lead to stroke, heart attack, or kidney failure. High blood pressure is called "the silent killer" because there are no signs or symptoms. Uncontrolled high blood pressure increases a person's stroke risk by 4 to 6 times.

In most people, high blood pressure can be controlled through healthy habits and taking medicines—or a combination of both. Healthier choices can include a low-salt, low-fat diet, including exercise in your daily routine and if you drink alcohol, do so in moderation. If you are on medication, stay on it even when you feel fine. A blood pressure reading below 120/80 is considered normal.

If you have already had a stroke, lowering your blood pressure can reduce your risk of having another stroke. Other ways to reduce your risk of stroke include finding out whether you have atrial fibrillation, stopping smoking, finding out if you have high cholesterol, and, if diabetic, following recommendations to control your diabetes. Also exercise and enjoy a lower salt and lower fat diet.

Know the symptoms of stroke! When stroke hits, long – term disability can be significantly cut if you get medical care **FAST** (symptoms below).

Face droops on one side

Arms drift downward when raised

Speech is slurred

Time is critical; CALL 9-1-1 IMMEDIATELY

A severe headache with no known cause is another key warning sign of a stroke.

The GOOD NEWS is that up to 80% of strokes can be prevented by controlling risk factors! High blood pressure is the most common cause of stroke, so make sure to check your blood pressure at least yearly and follow up with your doctor.
